Results for 2004: Many, many thanks to all those who persevered through bad weather and disappointing results to monitor and report on their lines. Without their hard work bluebirds would indeed be in trouble in SW Manitoba.

As a glance at our results table will show, not only did our nest numbers tumble as a result of the May blizzard, but the number of lines and boxes being monitored is at an all-time low. We need to work hard at recruiting new volunteers to assist us in maintaining nest box numbers. Those of us who have monitored in the past and are still able to do so should perhaps consider rededicating ourselves to the cause of bluebird conservation. Reporting of results is critical to an understanding of the success (or otherwise) of our work as a group.

A special thanks to those who were able to record nesting success. This information should serve as a baseline against which we can more clearly compare future results. Your data is also presented on the last page.

Retirees: The following have retired from active monitoring at the end of 2004, and we thank them for all their hard work in the past: George & Maureen Greelay (Brandon), Hazel & Wes Rose (Brandon) and June Zwolinski (Virden).

New Members: Clayton Baumung (Brandon), Evan Casselman(Boissevain), Bev Dunlop (Minnedosa), Lynne & Brian Manns (Brandon), Bert Perey (Brandon) and Jerry Wilson (Minnedosa) have all begun monitoring and reporting this past season. A hearty welcome to them all.

News from the Lines: There was a substantial increase in the number of cross-nestings this season, possibly due to blizzard related mortality and subsequent shortage of same species mates. Barbara Robinson reported 9 such nestings on her lines! Ray & Barb Pettinger continue their banding program, with 60 Mountain and 11 eastern Bluebirds banded. Don Proven reports the loss of nesting Eastern Bluebirds and Tree Swallows due to the use of herbicide to control Leafy Spurge in adjacent ditches.

Bridget & Arnold McPhaden reported a story with a happy ending. Two young bluebirds escaped from a box being checked and despite Bridget's best efforts she could retrieve only one. Until, that is, the father bluebird called the missing youngster back to the vicinity of the nest and recapture by Bridget. All's well that ends well!

A Special Plea: Please make every effort to use the Summary Forms to record your year's data, and to fill in the top of the form as completely as possible (your line number can be found on the outside of the envelope containing your monitoring kit). The poor fellow who deals with your summaries is easily confused!

New Meeting Venue: Beginning with the Spring 2005 meeting, we are moving from the University to the Riverbank Discovery Centre. More parking and much better access, amongst other benefits. More expensive, too, so we may be considering fund-raising in the near future. Your ideas for this are welcomed!

Free Nest Boxes: Over the years we have handed out many hundreds of free boxes (thanks to the efforts of Jack Webb, Don Proven and Bob Andrews, and the donation of wood by Jerry Wollman). Sadly, many of these boxes are on lines that aren't monitored or reported. We have decided that in the future that no more boxes will be given away to teams who have not sent in a report in the previous season. This change comes into effect for 2005. Not only is this an attempt to maximize the data we gather, but monitored lines present a better conservation strategy for bluebirds.

Postage Costs: To reduce unnecessary expense we will no longer mail out monitoring kits to teams who have not reported for two years in succession. If this affects you, and you find that circumstances permit your becoming active again, please let us know and we'll be delighted send a monitoring kit out to you.

Early Arrivals: Have you kept, or do you wish to keep, records of early bluebird arrival dates? It might be useful to start a file of such species/location/date records for our area. Robert K. Lane of Alberta (the son of our founders) has reported, in last summer's issue of Bluebird journal, on trends towards earlier migration patterns. Using data gathered over a 41 year period at the Ellis Bird Farm in central Alberta, he and a co-worker determined that Mountain Bluebirds were arriving back from the south an average of 16 days earlier than in the 1960's. Tree Swallows were showing up an average of 10 days earlier, and in both cases these shifts in arrival times seem strongly linked to parallel temperature gains over the past 40+ years.

While it seems likely similar global warming trends are occuring in SW Manitoba, data is needed to confirm this suspicion. Please feel free to send any records you might wish to share to Barry Danard. (Box 569, Killarney MB, R0K 1G0)

^{*} These numbers are probably on the high side, due to under reporting of nests lost due to the May blizzard. It is important when reporting on nesting success to include ALL nests, including those that failed for whatever reason.
